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Chapter 01 - Institutional Profile/Executive Summary

1.1 Introduction

The Department of Treasury Operations (TOD) was established on 28th July 2004 with the objectives of creating an efficient organizational structure within the Treasury to cater matters relating to the management of the Consolidated Fund and facilitate the public debt management function. In this endeavor, TOD translates estimated revenue and expenditure given in the National Budget into an operational cash inflow and outflow while identifying the deficit to be financed through the annual borrowing program. Public Debt Management Function of the Department also includes debt servicing and reporting on behalf of the government.



3.4 Notes to the Financial Statements

Basis of Reporting

1) Reporting Period

The reporting period for these Financial Statements is from 01^{st} January to 31^{st} December 2023.

2) Basis of Measurement

The Financial Statements have been prepared on historical cost modified by the revaluation of certain assets and accounted on a modified cash basis, unless otherwise specified.

The figures of the Financial Statements are presented in Sri Lankan rupees rounded to the nearest rupee.

3) <u>Recognition of Revenue</u>

Exchange and non exchange revenues are recognised on the cash receipts during the accounting period irrespective of relevant revenue period.

4) Recognition and Measurement of Property, Plant and Equipment (PP&E)

An item of Property, Plant and Equipment is recognized when it is probable that future economic benefit associated with the assets will flow to the entity and the cost of the assets can be reliably measured.

PP&E are measured at a cost and revaluation model is applied when cost model is not applicable.

5) Property, Plant and Equipment Reserve

This reserve account is the corresponding account of Property Plant and Equipment.

6) <u>Cash and Cash Equivalents</u>

Cash & cash equivalents include local currency notes and coins in hand as at 31st December 2023.

In cases where there are transactions which are specific to a particular reporting entity, relevant information can be entered in and revisions can be made as needed in the formats and the disclosure required for those specific transactions may be included under "Reporting Basis"

Only the accounting policies relevant to the reporting entity should be disclosed under the reporting basis.

In view of the economic and political crisis in the country in year 2023, the original estimates prepared at the beginning of the year were revised based on the actual revenue received during the first six months. However, due to the instability of the economy of the country throughout the year, there have been variations between the estimated revenue and the actual revenue.


- * Revision of original revenue estimate was made on 30.06.2023 based on the increased actual revenue reported by ministries during the first half of 2023, and the interest revenue received by investing excess revenue of the government in the money market. However, the revenue of interest has increased due to increase in government revenue collections and the investment of excess funds in DST's Official Bank Account.
- ** Estimates have been revised based on actual revenue in the first six months and the revenue which was not expected at the time of preparation the final estimates has received by the end of 2023.
- *** In preparing the estimates for the year 2023, the receipts under the sub-loans given for the import of urea fertilizers under the Indian Line of Credit Scheme and the World Bank loan assistance, the increase in the number of loan applications over the expected

amount of the SMILE III RF loan scheme for the year 2023, and the remittance of the loan installments charged in respect of the SAPP loan scheme in the year 2023 by the Central Bank of Sri Lanka to the Treasury had not been included in the original estimate and those receipts were included in the final estimates.

However, the Sub-loan of Rs. 228,770,919,566.31 (USD 700M) given to the Ceylon Petroleum Corporation under the Indian Line of Credit was to be settled on 31.12.2022, but due to non-payment sub-loan on the due date, it was accounted as revenue in the year 2023. Since the time frame for settling the loan amount was not specified at the time of preparing the estimates for the year 2023, this was not included in the estimates for the year 2023, but the revenue arrears has received.

Further, the unaccounted receipt of Rs.2, 114,353,124.50 at the time of preparation of the revised estimates for the year 2023 under the sub loan given for the distribution of urea fertilizer by the World Bank loan assistance program has also accounted during the latter part of 2023 on the full settlement of the same to the Treasury.

**** Revenue has increased due to the increase in Foreign Grants by way of materials and equipment and the increase in the utilization of cash Grants for the planned activities and projects during the year 2023.



Since the number of vacancies reported in the carder positions against the approved carder, it was a direct and main challenge to manage the human resource by strategically motivating officials of the department in achieving the organizational objectives.
